### Visitation and the Priesthood of All Believers

Oh, what a night! Late December back in '83...<sup>1</sup> I was getting a ride home from a neighbor and classmate of mine during the coldest Minnesota December on record – ten days in a row when the temperature never got above 0 degrees and a Christmas Eve whose HIGH temperature was -20. Jerry and I had just graduated the previous May and wanted to support his sister who sang in the High School choir and so we ventured out to get to the concert. On our way home when Jerry got near to the corner to turn down the township road that went to my home, he hit some black ice, lost control, and slid into the ditch. Having met no one on the roads that night and seeing no headlights for miles around, we discussed our options. If we keep running the car to stay warm, we could get carbon monoxide poisoning and die if the exhaust pipe was plugged by the snow. If we shut the car off and all bundled together until who-knows-when, waiting for someone to come by and pull us out, we may make it for a few hours, but by morning we could be frozen to death. The third option was that I would run home, get a tractor, and pull the car out of the ditch. I was a runner and so running  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile, despite the temperature and windchill, still should only take me about 8-9 minutes. I was not wearing running shoes, but boots. I was not wearing shorts and a t-shirt, but a thick, heavy winter coat, hat, and mittens. While 8-9 minutes sounds like a slow time, given the conditions and the attire, I thought it was still our best option, so I headed off into the bitterly cold, December night.

What I did not have was a scarf or a balaclava or anything to cover my mouth. By the time I reached home my lungs were so cold that I think I froze some bronchial tubes in my lungs. When I started to breathe warm air in again, I felt moisture building in my lungs as they started to thaw. I began coughing up liquid from my lungs. My dad got in a tractor and went up and pulled out our neighbors, while my mom stayed up with me monitoring my breathing. At times I felt like I was drowning in the liquid in my lungs. I wheezed and coughed, coughed and wheezed. As long as I kept coughing and breathing – though difficult – I thought I was ok.

But I wasn't. In the wee-morning hours, my folks had to rush me to the Emergency Room. I had damaged my lungs, and this became my first bout with asthma. Since then, due to the damage done that bitterly cold night, I have had numerous trips to the ER. I manage my asthma very well, but my lungs seem to be reactionary. I can go from a few slight symptoms to needing to go the ER very quickly.

I did not have to share my personal health information with you. I chose to share this information because we cannot just look at someone and know their health history. Even though I look healthy, I am a high-risk person for Covid. My damaged lungs are no match for a virus that attacks the lungs, the heart, and other internal organs. I am extremely cautious because I don't see how my death would benefit Deborah, my children, my family, or you, my church family. Even though we are not called to be martyrs, I am not afraid to die taking a stand on behalf of the gospel. I am afraid of dying as a martyr to our own stupidity, though, which is why we must be vigilant and take every precaution.

This is why I have not been visiting. There are many hospital chaplains who are not able to visit people in their own facilities. They have been calling the patients on the telephone or nurses have been bringing patients electronic tablets to use for a visit. Psychologists and counselors are doing all of their work electronically. I do not need to be physically present in order to provide pastoral care. I am willing to talk to you on the phone, FaceTime with you, or Zoom with you. (My number is 763-439-9971. If I am busy, just leave a message and I will get back to you. You may also text or email me to arrange a time to talk.) In the time being, I am here for you, but for both my safety and yours, I will not make home visits or have you come to the church office. I am glad we got the TLC Callers up and running early during the pandemic, so that there were people from Trinity who were calling on our members. It is not a perfect system, but it does enlist the gifts and skills of lay people who are committed to doing ministry to Trinity's siblings in Christ.

This is much like what Martin Luther advocated when he developed a concept called "the priesthood of all believers." At its essence is that all of the baptized have a duty and obligation to proclaim the gospel by talking and listening with others, praying with them, and being present for them. (Gospel with a capital "G" is a proper name, as in the Gospel of Luke, whereas gospel with a lower case "g" means the good news that comes through the forgiveness, grace, mercy, and love of God.) Because we are baptized, we all are to proclaim the gospel, which in this case means that those of us who are lower risk can form a "bubble" with another person or family in need who is higher risk. Lower risk people can help their neighbors by getting items from the store or, perhaps, can safely visit them with masks on, physically distanced, and outside. If you think this looks like a "team" approach to ministry, well, it is. All of us – pastor, staff, and congregation – are a part of the same team to reach out to love and serve the neighbor; neighbors both inside and outside the congregation.

A team approach to visitation should not be seen as a "temporary" thing until the pastor can safely visit again. You are being church when you do this. This is the way ministry is always done.

Thanks to those people of Trinity who have been able to visit others. I especially grieve for those who are cut off from the congregation because they do not have the technology to join us on YouTube for worship, or Zoom for Bible studies, fellowship opportunities, or meetings. It is my hope that now that the outdoor temperatures have gone down from this summer's heat that we can safely worship outside, which will help us all re-connect to one another during this most difficult of times.

## Cantor's Notes

+ **Thank you for singing at home** when you are watching and participating in our online worship services. The music for the hymns, psalm, and gospel acclamation is included in the PDF file of the worship service that is emailed each week. When we record the online worship services, please know that “in our minds’ eyes” we see you in the pews and hear you singing with us!

+ **Hymn Story: *Now Thank We All Our God*.** Written by Martin Rinkhart, (1586-1649) this well-known German hymn is often associated with Thanksgiving Day or other festival services. Its origins were on a thoroughly different scale: the author intended it for his children to sing as a table prayer. The hymn was written during the Thirty Years’ War (1618-1648), far from the circumstances of peace and plenty that it may suggest. There is much more gratitude here for much less than the benefits enjoyed by many people who sing this hymn today.

Pastor Rinkhart based the first two stanzas on verses from the book of the Apocrypha, Ecclesiasticus (also called Sirach) 50:22-24. “Now bless the God of all, who everywhere works great wonders, who fosters our growth from birth, and deals with us according to his mercy. May he give us gladness of heart and may there be peace in our days in Israel, as in the days of old. May he entrust us to his mercy, and may he deliver us in our days!” The final stanza is a Trinitarian doxology.

In 1617, just before the Thirty Years’ War began and a century after Luther posted his Ninety-Five Theses, Rinkhart wrote a set of seven dramas to commemorate the Reformation. His sixty-six hymns were published after that, during the Thirty Years’ War, which was Rinkhart’s daily and literal plague. Eilenburg was a walled city where people tried to take refuge from the ravages of the war. But armies plundered there, and starvation, famine, and plague stalked the town. In 1637 Rinkhart was the only minister left. He buried his own wife along with up to forty or fifty people a day and 4,500 in the course of the year. Altogether eight thousand died in two years in the epidemic, and finally people apparently had to be buried in trenches.

Rinkhart was a poet, musician, and faithful pastor. He died one year after the end of the war, marked by the Peace (treaty) of Westphalia, when this hymn was sung as part of the celebration.

*Now thank we all our God with hearts and hands and voices,

*Oh, may this bounteous God through all our life be near us,  
with ever joyful hearts and blessed peace to cheer us,  
and keep us all in grace, and guide us when perplexed,  
and free us from all harm in this world and the next.*

*All praise and thanks to God the Father now be given,  
the Son, and Spirit blest, who reign in highest heaven,  
the one eternal God, whom earth and heav'n adore;  
for thus it was, is now, and shall be evermore.*


## Thanksgiving Eve Worship



A child's path to a brighter future is paved with books.

We are all a part of this team as we are all Stewards of God's gifts to each of us, young and old and every age in between.

Webster says that a Steward is a fiscal agent; one who actively directs affairs.

Stewardship is also defined as the office, duties, and obligations of a steward; also, the individual's responsibility to manage his/her life and property with proper regard to the rights of others.

Stewardship is part of our Spiritual Well-Being, as was introduced last month. God blesses us – and a lot of folks stop right there – but He blesses us TO BE A BLESSING. In the stewardship of what God blesses us with (which we call OURS – really?) we are expected to be a sharing example to others of what God has shared with us. We are expected to complete the gift giving: it does not stop with us. As the hymn states: "May we Thy bounties thus as stewards true receive, and gladly as Thou blesset us, to Thee our first-fruits give." (#686)

Jesus speaks to us in Luke 12:47 "The servant who knows what his master wants and ignores it, or insolently does whatever he pleases, will be thoroughly thrashed." (The Message) Additional stewardship information be found in Luke 16:1-12 where Jesus tells us about the master who takes away the servant's stewardship duties.

What we as stewards want to hear is for Jesus to tell us, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant." In Matthew 5:48 Jesus tells us, "You are kingdom subjects. Now live like it. Live out your God created identity. Live generously and graciously toward others, the way God lives toward you." (The Message) And when we have done that we can sing with gusto, "Praise God from Whom all blessings flow; praise Him, all creatures here below; praise Him above, ye heav'nly host; praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost." (#884)
