#### **On-Going Reformation**

Change. Change has always been difficult. Even Martin Luther resisted change. He was not trying to start a "new" Church. He was trying to improve the existing Church. And he was against calling the Churches that followed him "Lutheran." Luther thought that they should just be called "Church." (My internship supervisor honored Luther by answering the phone, "Bethany Church" instead of "Bethany Lutheran Church.")

Changing something points toward reforming it. It is taking something good, making changes, in order to make it better, or more effective for today's world.

We are in a "reformation" time at Trinity. Some changes are reactions to what we have been dealt. Others changes we are making. Here are some of those changes:

- + The pandemic invited us to use technology differently. We started doing worship and Bible studies and meetings online. Many churches, like Trinity, will continue to do online worship as a way for people to "check us out" and for others to worship with us no matter where they live as long as they have an internet connection. Other churches find that doing business meetings via Zoom is a way to be good stewards of the environment and of member's time. No one needs to drive to get to the meeting and there is zero commute time. When the meeting is done, everybody is already home to spend more time with their family. Technology is a part of our everyday lives and so Trinity also needs to use technology if we are going to be relevant.
- + We are considering a new tagline. This is meant to sharpen our focus as we talk to others about Trinity. Hospitality, Outreach, Praise, and Education would be the four "talking points" to begin a conversation with others about Trinity. While most people like HOPE, others weren't as excited on the "There's plenty to go around" part. So, we are asking people (YOU!) to give us more lines to consider. (See other article in this newsletter.)
- + We are considering restructuring our teams to match our talking points. We would have four primary teams: Hospitality (combining Fellowship, Property, Columbarium care), Outreach (combining Witness, Outreach, and Care Team), Praise (renamed from Worship, Music and the Arts), and Education (Christian Education, Finance, Stewardship, and Columbarium administration).
- + We are saying Farewell and Godspeed to Phyllis D'Alessio. Phyllis started as the office administrator in 1998 and has worked with a number of pastors during those years, both called and interim. Phyllis has served the Lord and has provided constant, steady leadership during times of uncertainty and transition. She has been the stabilizing force for our ministry for over two decades. We will have a special recognition for Phyllis in the sanctuary immediately following worship on Sunday, October 24. We invite you to send a card and, if you wish, a gift.

Please send them to the church and mark them with "Phyllis Celebration" so that we can present all of the cards to her on that day.

+ We are saying **Welcome to Mary Parada!** Mary is a faithful member of Trinity, but she is also taking over the office administrator position. As the person who is on the "front line" for people who call Trinity, the office administrator must be someone who has a pleasing personality, who is organized, efficient, and can direct people so that they get the help they need. Mary possesses all of these gifts and traits. Please welcome her, help her, be patient with her, and pray for her. Welcome, Mary!



These are just a few of the changes taking place that will "reform" the ministry at Trinity. It is not as big as the Luther's Reformation, but change does not have to be big to re-form us.

#### Pastor Tim on Vacation

Pastor Tim will be on vacation from October 1-14. Pastor Janet Grill will be available for emergency pastoral care situations and will be doing pulpit supply on October 3 and 10. There will be no Bible Study on October 4 and 11. Also, there will not be video worship options for those Sundays. We are transitioning to a Live-stream format instead of a recorded and uploaded format. Please be patient with us as we get the new equipment installed and people trained. ### Florida-Bahamas Synod Assembly

While June is the "usual" time for our synod assembly, the synod council voted to move the synod assembly to September to give voting members plenty of time to get vaccinated so that we could have an "in person" assembly. Then, delta hit. The delta variant of the corona virus sent numbers soaring in Florida. The synod council then moved the assembly to an on-line assembly and moved it to October 15-16. We thank Joe and Grace Kellermeier for volunteering to serve as Trinity's voting members.

#### Cantor's Notes

# "We believe that the holy act of singing together shapes faith, heals brokenness, transforms lives, and renews peace."

The guiding stance of The Center for Congregational Song of the Hymn Society in the United States and Canada.

+ Hymn Stories: *Rise, O Church, like Christ Arisen*, ELW 548 This hymn was commissioned by the Lutheran Church of the Resurrection in Roseville, MN, as part of the celebration of their fiftieth anniversary. (Pastor Tim served this congregation before coming to Trinity!) Author Susan Palo Cherwien focuses on our identity as God's people, our choice in following the wounded Christ, and the cost of such a choice. (Cantor Larson and Susan attended Wittenberg University at the same time!)

The theme of identity in the first stanza centers on "whose we are, and whose, our praise." The implied question is "What has this 'meal of love and grace' taught you about identity and purpose?" The final line begins the series of Trinitarian references tying the first three stanzas together.

In the second stanza, the primary concern is the paradox that wholeness comes from following a resurrected but still wounded Christ, who offers us a fullness of life devoid of false claims of perfection. As in the "meal of love and grace," brokenness becomes the means of participation and sharing, and a reminder of our call to reach out to others. The Trinitarian pattern continues with reference to Christ, the center of our life.

Stanza three completes the Trinitarian perspective with attention to the Spirit, the energy that leads us into God's future. With gentle wordplay serving as a reminder that joy can also be a means of discernment, we are offered the affirmation "spirited then let us live." This language is nearly echoed in the final Trinitarian line.

The closing stanza weaves together three themes expressing what it means to live out a resurrection faith: "service," "courage," and "mercy." These relate to the beginning of the text by a final line employing the same first three words, "Rise, O church."

Notice the frequent use of "slant" (near rhyme): arisen/envision, grace/praise, follow/hallowed, future/nurture. Exact rhymes come in the final stanza: vocation/destination, breath/death. Each stanza ends with double alleluias!

As we stand to sing this hymn at the conclusion of the Lord's Supper, we are quite literally embodying our faith. This text helps us understand the church's actions as expressions of the church's faith.

When this hymn was commissioned, Timothy Strand was Resurrection's cantor. He composed the tune and named it SURGE, ECCLESIA, the first two words of the text in Latin.

Rise, O church, like Christ arisen, from this meal of love and grace; may we through such love envision whose we are, and whose, our praise. Alleluia, alleluia; God, the wonder of our days.

Rise, transformed, and choose to follow after Christ, though wounded, whole; broken, shared, our lives are hallowed to release and to console.

Alleluia, alleluia; Christ, our present, past, and goal.

Rise, remember well the future God has called us to receive; present by God's loving nurture, Spirited then let us live.

Alleluia, alleluia; Spirit, grace by whom we live.

Service be our sure vocation; courage be our daily breath; mercy be our destination from this day and unto death. Alleluia, alleluia. Rise, O church, a living faith.



#### The Sunday Study

The next book we will be reading is Though Shall Not Be a Jerk by Eugene Cho. Cho is the President/CEO of Bread for the World, a collective Christian voice that works in a bi-partisan way to end hunger at home and abroad. Pastor Tim has worked with Bread for the World in the past. Here is what it says about the book:



According to Eugene Cho, Christians should never profess blind loyalty to a party. Any party. But they should engage with politics, because politics inform policies which impact people.

In *Thou Shalt Not Be a Jerk: A Christian's Guide to Engaging Politics*, Cho encourages readers to remember that hope arrived—not in a politician, system, or great nation—but in the person of Jesus Christ.

With determination and heart, Cho urges readers to stop vilifying those they disagree with—especially the vulnerable—and asks Christians to follow Jesus and reflect Christ's teachings. In this book that integrates the pastoral, prophetic, practical, and personal, readers will be inspired to stay engaged,

have integrity, listen to the hurting, and vote their convictions.

"When we stay in the Scriptures, pray for wisdom, and advocate for the vulnerable, our love for politics, ideology, philosophy, or even theology, stop superseding our love for God and neighbor."

#### **AUGUST 2021**

- \*In August, two of our Mission Investment Funds reached their maturity dates. In order to have the cash to pay our bills, we withdrew these two funds. The total was \$3651 which appears as a part of the General Offering Income.
- Also in August, our General Offering Income was nominally higher due to the letter to the congregation regarding our financial situation. Thank you to everyone who generously responded to the continuing financial need to maintain our mission.

#### **GENERAL FUND BALANCE**

- The General Fund Balance is negative \$35,692.93. Note that we started the year with a General Fund Balance of negative \$26,947.88.
- We are preparing the 2022 Spending Plan which will be discussed at the Congregation Phase I
  Meeting on December 5, 2021. We started 2021 in the negative and have not been able to
  improve the General Fund Balance which is affecting our monthly cash flow. Please prayerfully
  consider a 2021 financial gift to Trinity to help us meet our goals.
